

Mandatory Continuing Education for CPCUs

The American Institute for Property and Liability Underwriters is once again reviewing mandatory continuing education (MCE) versus leaving it optional. In the 1970s, the question of MCE was raised and settled. Societal views of continuing education and lifelong learning, as well as continuing education mandates, have changed significantly since then. The Institute has not made a decision on this yet, and the Institutes' Board of Trustees will not make a decision without adequate input from various stakeholders-including members of the CPCU Society.

Surveys, discussions by Chapters, and letters from stakeholders provide the carefully considered reasoning that can help provide the basis for a defensible decision to add or to abstain from an MCE requirement. The institutes want to hear from you, especially if you feel strongly in either direction. You can send your thoughts to them, by September 30, by writing to:

1995-96 Annual Report to Chapter Membership

The President for the 1995-96 Chapter year was T.C. McDonnell, CPCU.

The Philadelphia Chapter had significant inroads in "Building New Expertise." We distributed an interest survey to the new Designee class (125 people) as well as the general membership. A database was created and used to identify people with specific expertise and/or interest to fulfill committee needs or respond to requests made of the Chapter. The Chapter purchased a laptop computer which will be kept by the Chapter Secretary. Minutes, Treasurer's reports and chapter databases will be stored in the computer.

Fiftieth Anniversary

Under the direction of Art Hanebury, CPCU, a committee was formed to pursue celebration ideas relative to the Chapter's 50 years of service to the community. A proposal will be submitted during the budget planning process in the summer of 1996. A number of past presidents were asked to participate in the planning process and to help finalize activities.

Fire Essay Contests

We held our 12th Annual Fire Safety in the Home essay contest co-sponsored by the Council Rock School District located in Bucks County. The essays were written during National Fire Prevention Week. This contest is chaired by Peter F. Palestina, CPCU. Awards were presented to the winning elementary students on November 20, at the Council Rock Board meeting and November 22, at the Northampton Township Board of Supervisors public meeting. Elected officials of Northampton Township, Newtown Township and Newtown Borough presented citations to the winning students, who reside in the respective municipalities. Both meetings were broadcast live over the local cable network to five municipalities. Peter F. Palestina, CPCU, T.C. McDonnell, CPCU, and Cynthia Wolkiewicz, CPCU, made the presentations.

We held our Third Annual Fire Safety in the Home essay contest co-sponsored by the School District of Philadelphia on April 16 at the Districts 21st and the Parkway Board room. This contest is chaired by Shiang Wu, CPCU. Wade Communications also assisted in this event. On hand for the presentation were Shiang Wu, CPCU, Peter F. Palestina, CPCU, Sandra Loebs, CPCU and Maria Perez-Freedman, CPCU.

Membership

The membership committee, headed by Bernadette B. Fuller, CPCU has delightfully been expanded to eleven people. The committee launched a membership calling campaign to unpaid members and at the same time the committee surveyed those members' needs and desires.

Franklin Award

This committee is chaired by Josephine Battisti, CPCU. Our recipient for the 14th annual award was chapter member Peter F. Palestina, CPCU. The award was presented at the DoubleTree Hotel in Philadelphia on March 21, 1996. Two hundred people attended which was the largest attendance in the history of the Franklin Award. The keynote speaker was Pennsylvania Lt. Governor Mark Schweiker.

New Designees

Under the direction of Sandra L. Loebs, CPCU, a new designee telephone tree was established and headed by new designee Val Ullman-Katz, CPCU, and assisted by Maria Perez-Freedman, CPCU, Rich Ventura, CPCU, Stephen Feldman, CPCU, and Joseph (Jay) Burke Jr., CPCU. New Designee ribbons and 1995 annual pins were purchased. New Designees were invited to a free breakfast in September. Sandra L. Loebs, CPCU, prepared a tip sheet for the new Designees so they would know what to expect/attend/do at the Annual Society meeting in Hawaii. The committee helped with registration and diplomas for new designees at Philly I-Day, and also planned the I-Day reception honoring new designees.

Philly I-Day

The chapter, joined with the Independent Agents of Philadelphia and its suburbs, Insurance Society of Philadelphia, and the Insurance Institute of America, sponsored CPCU graduates at Philly I-Day held on October 16, 1995. There were 580 participants. In addition, the Insurance Institute presented their National Honors Awards at I-Day. Philly I-Day for 1996 will occur on November 4, 1996. Paul Hertel III, CPCU, continues as chairperson of this committee.

Programs

Anne Kopanski, CPCU, with help from Karen Willimann, CPCU and others, organized programs this year. Here are the programs that were presented:

- December 14, 1995-Topic: Demystifying the Litigation Process: From Summons to Depositions.
- January 18, 1996-Topic: What's New in Risk Control? Where is the Industry Headed? Speaker was Kord Spielmann, ARM, of Risk Enterprise Management, Ltd.
- February 15, 1996-Topic: Network with the Sections and Society Update. Speaker was Cynthia Ziegler, CPCU, Vice President of the CPCU Society.
- 7. March 21, 1996-Topic: Fourteenth Annual Franklin Award Luncheon.
- 8. April 18, 1996-Topic: Stand Up...Speak Out. Speakers were Mike Gidlewski of Achievement Unlimited and Toastmasters, John Doubman, Sec/Counsel the Insurance Federation and Tom Pivnichny, Director of the Delaware County Technical Schools.
- May 16, 1996-Topic: Internet Roadmap-The Time is Now. Speakers were Ron Martin, Vice President, Chester County InterLink and Mary Rowley, Vice President, CPCU Society.
- June 18, 1996-Topic: Workers Compensation; Annual Meeting and Installation of Officers. Speakers were Tim Wisecarver, Mgr. PA Compensation Rating Bureau, Mary Keenan, CPCU, Exec. Vice Pres. Tower Associates and John Naughton, Asst. Vice Pres. Commonwealth Risk Services.

Research

A chapter research project entitled "Do You Hear What I Heir" will be published in fiscal '96-97. This will address the impact of jargon on the relationship between the insurance industry and their customers. The author is Larry Gross, CPCU, and his contention is that the words we speak, the language or jargon of the insurance industry creates an environment where communication goes wrong and meaning is distorted. The result of this is that people form strong negative emotions about the messengers, despite the fact that the insurer, the producer or other insurance professionals might do everything correctly. The objective of this project will be to establish this premise and support it by literature review of other entities that have their own language (information systems, technicians, politicians, journalists, etc.) He will cite how others outside these cultures react to them and look to see where there might be anecdotal evidence to tie together any similarities to the industry.

Continuing Education

Under the direction of R. Bruce Tuttle, CPCU, the Chapter applied for and was approved as a course sponsor in PA. The approval is for a 24 month period at which time the Chapter will reapply. The committee will pursue state certified CE approval for breakfast meetings in the future.

Chaptergram

Peter F. Palestina, CPCU, Editor of the Chaptergram since 1983, published four issues (eight pages each) which were distributed September '95, December '95, March '96, and June '96. In addition two new two page interim Chaptergrams were published, one in November '95 and the other February '96. These issues piggybacked with monthly meeting mailings in order to save postage. Compliments from both internal and external readers are made about the Chaptergram; ours is used as a model for other chapters.

Public Relations

The chapter's public relations committee plays an important role in: securing public recognition for chapter activities, advising the public through the news media of important events, and gaining recognition for the CPCU designation. The committee sent out press releases, recorded a number of speaking engagements and held fire essay contests this year for two different school districts. Chairperson Karen Willimann, CPCU, also reported on the press releases for the I-Day and the ethics summit held.

Project Invest

Anne Kopanski, CPCU, chairperson directed this committee in a few activities that helped bring an understanding of the insurance mechanism to school children. The chapter's executive board approved the purchase of five textbooks, to be used by high school students. The committee enlisted the assistance of Anthony Sgobbo, CPCU, in educating students about Loss Control work in the insurance industry. Some of the high school students assisted the Board Game committee by playing the prototype game, then providing feedback about the game.

Resources

This is a newly established committee chaired by Maggie Stewart, CPCU. This committee captures, on an ongoing basis, member information, interest and skills, which can later be used by the chapter in getting activities done. Several committees were expanded using this database and speakers were identified. This was made possible through the Resource Guide. The guide will be updated annually and will be made available to the Philadelphia Chapter Committee Chairs and members to allow the Philadelphia Chapter to become a more effective organization.

Seminars

The Seminars Committee, headed by Cynthia Wolkiewicz, CPCU, provided support to the National CPCU Society on September 12, 1995 by mailing out brochures and assisting at the registration table for the "Get the Lead Out" Symposium. On December 12, 1995 we held a half day workshop entitled "How to Issue Certificates and Binders Correctly." On February 28, 1996, we offered a half day workshop entitled: "Advanced Risk Financing Techniques" and on May 22, 1996, we offered a new workshop entitled: "Mergers and Acquisitions."

Social

A joint chapter family picnic with the Greater Valley Forge Chapter has been arranged for August 17, 1996, at the Core Creek Park in Bucks County. More than 200 people are expected to attend. There will be organized games for all age groups. Chapter volunteers will be doing all the work, including the barbecue and facilities' arrangements. Peter F. Palestina, CPCU, is the committee chairperson. There will be an Olympic-style competition between the two chapters and the winning chapter will receive a trophy.

Standard Setter

The chapter nominated Peter F. Palestina, CPCU for the National Society's monthly Standard Setter Awards. Pete was selected and awarded the Standard Setter Award for November 1995. On May 16, the chapter submitted the name of Sandra Loebs, CPCU for recognition and candidate for a future Standard Setter Award.

Chapter Officers' Leadership Conference

The Society's COLC for our chapter region was held by the National Society in Hartford, CT in May 1996. This two day conference was attended by first Vice President Bruce Tuttle, CPCU and Secretary Sandra Loebs, CPCU.

Special Olympics

Cynthia Gantz, CPCU chaired the committee which participated in the May 14, 1996 Philadelphia Special Olympics held at Northeast High School in Philadelphia.



The May 16th breakfast meeting featured Ronald W. Martin, CEO, Chester County InterLink. You've heard a lot of hype about the information Super Highway, but it is not completed yet. By the year 2000 all business will be done via the internet and stored on CD ROM. Since 1969 mainframes have been talking to each other. These were mostly government and university sites using document exchange and e-mail. With today's distribution revolution, a presence on the web will successfully market products and increase customer contact.

In a live demonstration, Ron showed us the CPCU Society home page and one from the New York chapter. To surf the net you will need a computer with windows multi-tasking; a modem; and internet access. Search engine software like Info Seek uses key works to locate cool web sites. Ron typed in the word "insurance" and 19,392 sites were listed, plus an ad for Zurich Direct came up on our screen offering

quotes online 24 hours a day.

Security is constantly being updated and is now encrypted. How easy it is now to break into your office or mail. Credit cards can be used by waiters today. Local providers are offering lower prices and better service than more well known ones

like America Online.

Mary Rowley of the CPCU Society talked about all the improvements coming to the national home page http://insureinfo.com/cpcu/ This will be open to all with certain services limited to members. You will be able to download brochures; print press releases; visit the job network; join a Sections chatroom; buy CPCU goods from the catalog; and pay your dues.

June Meeting Recap Workers' Compensation Update

Workers' compensation was the principal topic at the monthly breakfast meeting held on June 18. The program began with a brief business meeting conducted by outgoing president T.C. McDonnell. Dispensing with the minutes of the previous meeting, McDonnell announced there will be a celebration of the chapter's 50th anniversary in January

1997. Copies of the President's Award submission were available for member's review. The annual statement is not yet available but chapter finances are in good shape. The business portion of the meeting concluded with the swearing in of new officers and directors led by President Bruce Tuttle and the presentation of personal

A panel of speakers consisting of Timothy Wisecarver of the Pennsylvania Compensation Rating Bureau; Mary Keenan of Tower Associates (and a new chapter member!); and John T. Naughton of Commonwealth Risk Services gave an update on

the Workers' Comp. situation in Pennsylvania.

Tim described how Act 44 changed the rating system and medical benefits, and the controversy over how these changes are incorporated into rates. Now there is House Bill 2216 which proposes to change many facets of the system including coordination of benefits, calculation of wages, vocational standards, back salary, supersedeas, compromise and release. The fate of this legislation is still uncertain.

Mary discussed the growing trend to group self insurance. There are now 250 self insurance groups nationwide. In Pennsylvania there are 25 or 26 groups; although at first self insurance was used by public entities most new groups are private (16 at last count). Most groups have been set up by agents. Surprisingly, only about half buy

aggregate coverage.

A successful group should be homogeneous with similar loss experience among members. The hardest part of setting up a group is data gathering; experience modification worksheets are helpful. Group members need a commitment to loss control and cost containment and a risk management plan is essential. The group should have at least \$1 million in premium and over \$1 million net worth.

Advantages of group self insurance are stability, control of the program, elimination of residual market fees, profit sharing, cash flow benefits and no fronting fees. Disadvantages are administrative costs, joint and several liability, and possible assessments. Multi-state firms many have a problem insuring out of state risks.

John discussed captives and rent-a-captives and explained the method of operation and cash flow. The ideal captive exposure is frequent predictable losses, a long tail exposure and a cyclical line in a traditional market. Workers' compensation fulfills these requirements. Captive benefits are stable premiums, lower net cost, control of the program and flexibility. Captives should be used where self insurance is not available and for multi-state risks. Minimum premium size is \$600,000.00 for a single entity and \$1.2 million for associations.

A question and answer period concluded the program.



April Meeting Recap

The April breakfast meeting was held on April 18, 1996 with the topic being "Stand Up-Speak Out." The subject was public speaking and how insurance professionals can benefit their industry, community, and themselves through speaking out on important issues. There were three terrific speakers and Michael Gidlewski, of Achievement Unlimited started off the discussion. He quoted from the *Book of Lists* stating that the fear of public speaking actually outranks the fear of death or cancer. His suggestion for overcoming this fear is to get the butterflies to fly in formation." The benefits of doing so include: an opportunity to build your vocabulary, increased ability to think on your feet, and improved motivation, self esteem and self confidence. Mr. Gidlewski advised the best way to get started is to decide what you want to do, set a goal and then move beyond your comfort zone. You should start slowly with a short talk and then gradually build up to longer presentations. The important keys are good preparation and an organized thought process in formulating your speech.

The second speaker was John Doubman who is Secretary and Counsel for the Insurance Federation. Mr. Doubman's focus was on getting insurance industry people involved with community groups to improve the legislative process in Pennsylvania. The politicians receive a lot of input on issues such as Workers' Compensation, Health Care, and auto insurance from public interest groups or from lobbyists. Unfortunately, they do not hear much from the voters they actually represent. It is the responsibility of insurance professionals who have the expertise and information on these issues to transmit this knowledge to the general public. By speaking to community groups on these issues, constituents can become informed on issues and convey their opinions to their government representatives. He stressed the power of one citizen to speak out on issues. It very often takes little pressure from a constituent to change a politician's vote on pending bills. It is the job of everyone within the insurance industry to share our understanding of issues with our communities in order to bring about changes in how decisions are made in the state government.

The final speaker was Thomas Pivnichny who is the Director of Delaware County Technical Schools. He echoed some of the ideas of John Doubman and raised some additional issues facing the insurance industry. These would include consumers' desire for individual service and low cost, competition from banks wishing to enter the field, and the recent trend in mergers and consolidation of companies. Consumers are concerned about these and many other issues and are looking for information from the insurance industry. Insurance professionals should take the opportunity to interact with trade associations, community and church groups. You can speak with small groups where your set the perimeters and establish a topic. By having a small group and knowing the material, you will feel more comfortable and be able to overcome any fear of speaking in public. Mr. Pivnichny compared getting started this wary to entering a cold ocean or pool of water. You get your feet wet first, and then slowly submerge yourself in the water. Once you have been in for a little while, it no longer feels uncomfortable. Another way insurance professionals can get involved is through program such as Project Invest by serving as a classroom speaker or mentoring an individual student. This way you can get involved with public speaking and making an impact on issues without having to get up in front of a large group of people.

All three speakers were very informative and enthusiastic and the program was well received by those in attendance.
